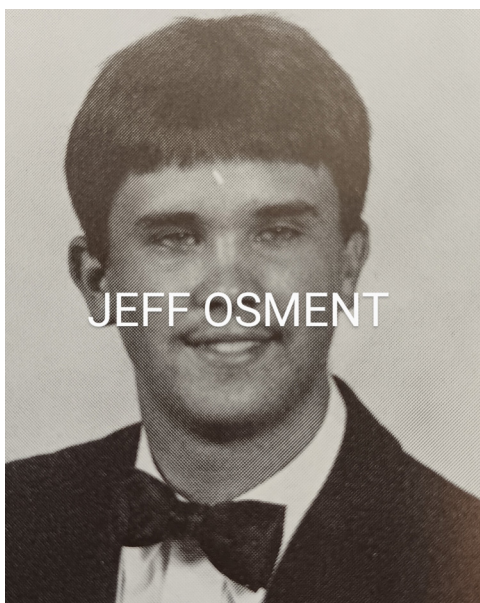

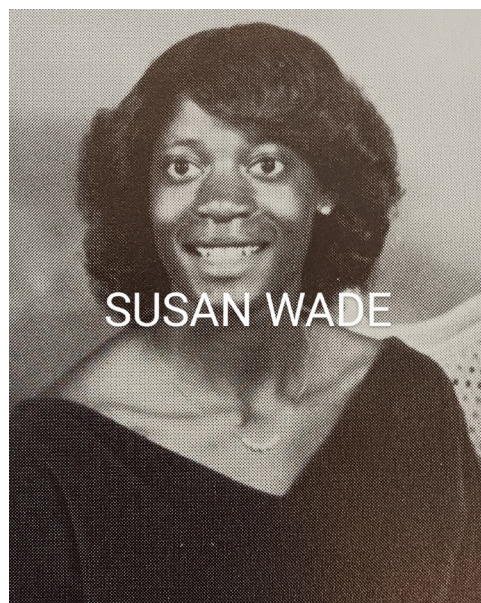
From Bookbags to Blackboards

As we interviewed and discovered why teachers came back to their home, here's some pictures of teacher's in their days as a teenage Indian!

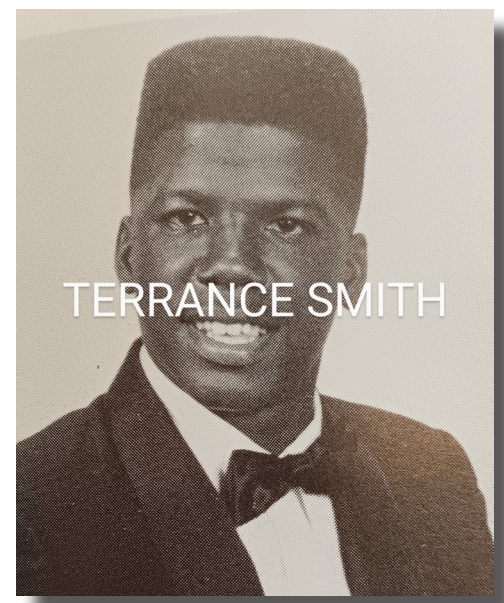
